This noble endeavor was started in 1999 by Senior Master Sgt. Steve Payne and Master Sgt. Richard Parker. Santa Cops raised \$684.00 in the inaugural year and continued climbing each year thereafter. The amount raised in 2008 was an unprecedented- more than \$17,000.00! Master Sgt. Parker took over the reins of

this massive project in 2007 due to Senior Master Sgt. Payne's move to Wing Staff.

The 134<sup>th</sup> Security Forces Squadron is the main force behind this project but receives a tremendous amount of support from other areas at McGhee Tyson. There were several retirees and other civilians that helped out during the mission in 2008.

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### **In-Residence NCO Academy Not Possible? - Enroll in Satellite NCO Academy**

McGhee Tyson is preparing to offer a Satellite NCO Academy course with the home station phase Mar. 3- May 21 and finishing with the in-residence phase May 26- June 10. If you are an eligible E-6 and want to attend this course of academic instruction, then this school is for you.

*HERE'S WHAT WE NEED TO GET THIS SATELLITE COURSE OFF THE GROUND:* a minimum of eight students up to a maximum of 15 students, and your commitment for 12 weeks to attend this course. Contact your immediate supervisor or First Sergeant to sign up for the Satellite NCO Academy School. You must be registered with the Base Education and Training Office for this course no later than 3 February 2009

#### WHAT IS THE SATELLITE NCO ACADEMY (SatNCOA)?

The Satellite EPME Program is an alternative means of attending the NCO Academy. It is NOT a replacement of the "in-residence" schools. It was specifically designed for those NCOs (ANG and Reserve traditional, AGR, Technicians, and active duty) who cannot attend the six-week, "in-residence" NCO Academy for whatever reason, but still want the education and experience of an "in-residence" training. The NCOs attending the SatNCOA receive the same curriculum as those attending the in-resident schools, including the same writing, speaking, and testing requirements. They are subject to the exact same standards of academics, physical fitness, discipline, and professionalism as the in-residence" credit on their personnel records. The difference between the Satellite schools and the in-resident schools is in the instructional delivery. The majority of the curriculum is taught by a pair of EPME Satellite Instructors via live satellite TV. A certified Site Facilitator follows up on the satellite instruction to ensure the students reach the appropriate level of learning.

#### HOW DOES THE SATELLITE PROGRAM WORK?

The Satellite program works on the distance-learning concept. In other words, the students are taught by trained, certified EPME Instructors but are not physically located with this instructor in a traditional classroom setting. These EPME Instructors teach the lessons via live satellite TV with 2-way audio and 1-way video. The 2-way audio enables the on-camera instructor to interact with the students by both asking the students questions and answering any questions the students may have. This interaction between the on-camera instructor and the students has shown to be critical to the learning environment. A certified Site Facilitator then leads the students in a guided discussion of the lesson material to ensure the students reach the established learning objectives. The delivery of the curriculum is divided into two separate phases. During the "home station" phase of the school, the NCOA students attend class 4 hours per night, 2 nights per week, for 11 weeks. The 2 week 'in-residence" phase of the school is taught at McGhee Tyson ANGB, TN or at the home station (on a case by case basis) where the remainder of the curriculum is delivered. The class itself consists of a maximum of 10 (minimum of 5) sites (home stations) with a maximum of 15 (minimum of 8) students per site. Each class is taught within the local time zone to ensure the live TV interaction with the students.

#### STUDENT SELECTION:

All Satellite NCOA students must meet the exact same selection requirements as an in-residence student, to include: time in grade, maintain fitness standards, skill level, time in service, etc. Students must be willing to commit themselves to the program for a total of 12 weeks at home station, with the final two-week in-residence phase at McGhee Tyson ANGB. ### **VA Announces Changes to Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance**

### **Traumatic Injury Protection Program Expands Benefits**

The Department of Veterans Affairs announced some severely injured military personnel and veterans will be eligible for improvements to the Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance Traumatic Injury Protection Program, known as TSGLI. "TSGLI was created to relieve some of the financial burdens on injured military personnel and their families," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Dr. James B. Peake. "We believe these enhancements to the TSGLI program have made a good program even better." VA recently completed a comprehensive review of the program, as it marked its first year in operation, to consider whether the program was meeting its intended purpose, whether new injuries or losses should be added, and whether improvements could be made in how the program is administered. As a result of this review, VA has increased the number of injuries covered as well as liberalized the criteria of other injuries. New injuries covered include the partial amputation of a hand or foot and the degree of injuries based on severe burns. Another important change to the TSGLI program is the payment of a \$25,000 benefit to service members hospitalized for 15 consecutive days as a result of a traumatic injury. This allows payments to begin earlier and financial help to be provided more guickly. Changes to benefits are retroactive to October 7, 2001, the beginning of Operation Enduring Freedom, consistent with the original legislation creating TSGLI. The TSGLI program is designed to provide severely injured service members and their families with short-term financial assistance. Service members who sustained certain severe injuries are entitled to payments ranging between \$25,000 and \$100,000.

TSGLI was designed to offset the expenses a service member's parents or spouse often incur when they move to be with their loved one during long and difficult treatment and rehabilitation periods, frequently causing family members to leave their jobs and homes for extended periods. Since the program began in 2005, over \$309 million in TSGLI benefits has been paid to injured members and their families. Veterans whose claims for TSGLI benefits were previously disallowed are being contacted if it appears their loss is now eligible for payment due to these changes. Service members or veterans who sustained severe traumatic injuries are encouraged to check the VA Insurance website at www. insurance.va.gov for eligibility criteria and contact information.

- **Roll Call Sunday** at **1215** you will report to the Headquarters building. Saturday, and Sunday morning you will report to your unit for roll call. You must report to roll call in order to get paid.
- **Pre-BMT class Sunday** of each drill at **1220**. This is a <u>mandatory</u> class (as directed by Col. **Dearing**) until you ship out to BMT. Any absence must be cleared through the recruiting office supervisor, Master Sgt. Bart Welch, ahead of time.
- In Processing Checklist Saturday at 0900 of your first drill weekend you are required to report to the photo lab (in the headquarters building) to have your portrait taken. This is <u>mandatory</u> in order to complete your in processing checklist.
- Security Clearance Process All new enlistees please ensure you have logged onto <u>www.opm.</u> <u>gov/e-gip</u>, to initiate your clearance. Once you have logged on, you have 60 DAYS to complete this. This is a mandatory item. Failure to complete on time will result in a counseling session with the Mission Support Flight Commander, Lt. Col. Steve Keeney. Note: answer 'unknown' the first time and only the first time you answer the question 'place of birth.'

With 47 nominations from Tenn. already submitted, Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, a Department of Defense agency, continues to encourage nominations of employers who have gone above and beyond in their support of military employees. Nominations will be accepted at <u>www.FreedomAward.mil</u> through **Jan. 19, 2009**. #### Acceptable Items

Computer equipment such as: PC systems, CPUs, monitors, mice, keyboards, printers, scanners, laptops, modems, hard drives, speakers, power cords, cables, phones, powers strips, desktop copiers, fax machines, <u>small</u> TVs (no consoles) and cell phones.

#### **Unacceptable Items**

Microwaves, electronics containing hazardous chemicals such as lab equipment, small refrigerators (contain freon), small stoves, small appliances, cardboard, scrap metal, aluminum cans, or newspapers.

#### **Involved Charities**

There are no fees being charged to drop off equipment, but monetary donations will gladly be accepted and will benefit Goodwill Industries and the Optimist Club of West Knoxville.

#### Why Recycle?

Computer monitors and televisions are hazardous because they contain significant amounts of lead. Printed circuit boards contain hazardous metals such as lead, chromium, cadmium and mercury, with significant variation depending on the board. Mercury-containing components like switches and relays are found in some electronic and electrical products. PCBs may be found in televisions and computers made before the early 1980s. The OEA encourages residents to take advantage of local recycling opportunities. Recycling old electronic equipment keeps hazardous materials out of waste and makes it possible to recover resources. Recyclers typically disassemble units, salvage reusable parts, and send materials to final processors.
