134th Deploys to Spangdahlem AB, Germany

Eighty-two members of the 134th ARW recently deployed to Spangdahlem AB, Germany for twelve days of training with their active duty counterparts and the opportunity to visit scenic Europe. Tennessee Air Guardsmen from McGhee Tyson ANGB, Tennessee worked side by side with the active duty component of the U.S. Air Force in a multitude of career fields which provided them the chance to see how operations are carried out on the active duty side as well as share some of the Air Guard ideas with the personnel at Spangdahlem. The 2010 deployment to Germany was commanded



by Lt. Col. Beth Hill, the 134th ARW Support Group Commander and she was assisted by Lt. Col. 134th Members Help with Locating Missing Remains of Service Members

During the recent wing deployment to Spangdahlem AB, Germany several members of the 134 ARW were invited to join in the efforts with a Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC) team to locate the missing remains of two downed aircrew members. The two aircrew members were believed to have perished with their aircraft during World War II. The aircraft they were flying was a B-26, a medium sized bomber used during WWII. It was determined to have gone down in 1944 in what is now a wooded area near Spangdahlem AB. It was determined that the other seven individuals who were on board exited the aircraft safely. Capt. Gary Taft, Tech. Sgt. John

Hopkins, Staff Sgt. Regina Trivette, and Tech. Sgt. Kendra Owenby all took part in the search. They were tasked with sifting through buckets of earth that had been retrieved by an excavator. The work was dirty and the hours long but the experience was one of a lifetime just to be able to do a small part in the recovery effort.

The JPAC teams travel around the globe to search for military members that are unaccounted for. JPAC's mission is to "achieve the fullest possible accounting of all Americans missing as a result of the nation's past conflicts." The organization is manned by approximately 400 military and civilians and the Headquarters for JPAC is located on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. JPAC's Central Identification Laboratory is responsible for identifying an average of six Americans per month.

interstates that literally spider-web the country with exits for most every town we would want to visit. In Germany the interstates are fewer and the amount of time spent on secondary roads is considerably higher than what we are used to.

Being able to see a country the size of Germany with a practical approach to energy conservation made him realize that we could do more as Americans to recycle and be more conscientious about the environment.

As for the value of deployments like this one to enlisting and re-enlisting, they both agreed that the Air Guard could offer little more as an incentive than the chance to travel to other countries and see places that others only dream of.

First Sergeant Positions Open for Security Forces Squadron & Logistics Readiness Squadron



There are two vacancies at this time for the position of First Sergeant. One for the position of First Sergeant (Master Sergeant) at the Security Forces Squadron and the second for the position of First Sergeant (Master Sergeant) at the Logistics Readiness Squadron.

We are currently accepting applications for retraining and assignment to this duty. If you are interested in applying for either of the positions, and if you meet the minimum listed qualifications, please follow the instructions in the "How To Apply" section below.

Minimum Qualifications - Must be currently serving in the grade of Master Sgt., Tech. Sgt. may be selected if they are immediately promotable, and they must be promoted on or before the date of assignment to the UMD position of First Sergeant.

Selected candidates must sign the following statement:

"I agree to attend the USAF First Sergeant Academy within 12 months of my assignment as First Sergeant. Failure to complete this requirement will result in my removal from the First Sergeant position and immediate demotion (if promoted as a result of assignment to this position.)"

-Must be highly motivated and capable of fulfilling the role of the First Sergeant as prescribed in AFI 36-2113, Chapter 1.

-Must have exceptional leadership and managerial skills.

-Must have ability to speak distinctly.

-Must have a minimum physical profile PULHES 322221

-Must be financially stable.

-Must meet minimum weight and body fat standards and overall image must exceed minimum standards.

-Must have completed the NCO Academy either in residence or by correspondence prior to application.

-Must agree to serve no less than 3 years as a First Sergeant after completion of the First Sergeant Academy.

-Must pass Air Force Physical Fitness Test.

How to Apply:

Prepare the following documents:

-AF Form 1206, Nomination for Award. (Use this form to document your individual qualifications)

-Letter of Recommendation from your current unit Commander

-Current RIP

Submit your application to the 134 MSF/DPM (Chief Master Sgt. Linda Gibson) **no later than 17 Sept 2010**. Qualified applicants will be scheduled to personally appear before a selection board. Candidates must wear the service dress uniform to meet the selection board. The selection board will be held during the September 18th-19th, 2010 Drill. Applicants will need to be prepared to perform their fitness test on Sat. Sept. 18th, 2010 during Drill.

If you have questions concerning the duties of a First Sergeant, please refer to AFI 36-2113. Questions relating to the selection board should be addressed to Chief Master Sgt. Jimmy Long, the Wing Command Chief Master Sergeant.

Boom Operator Opportunity at the 151st ARS

The 151st ARS Boom Operator Section will convene a selection board in October 2010, time and date to be determined. To be considered for the boom operator career field, an individual must have a minimum ASVAB (General) score of 55 and possess either a 5-Skill Level or 7-Skill Level AFSC. Individuals must also be able to pass the requirements for an Initial Class III Flying physical. Other prerequisites include physiological training (altitude chamber) and obtaining a Top Secret security clearance. Prospective candidates are required to provide a resume containing military and civilian work experience along with references. Letters of recommendation from civilian and military supervisors are highly recommended. The suspense date to have your resume to Chief Quagliana is NLT 9 September 2010. What is a Classified Message Incident, otherwise referred to as CMI? A CMI is when a classified message is emailed to an individual's unclassified email account. Someone has inadvertently entered information that is of a classified nature, or sent a classified attachment over the NIPRNet email system.

How would you recognize such an email? The message would be marked with a (S) or (C), and the words SECRET, CONFIDENTIAL visible. The attachment will have classification markings on the top and bottom of the pages. There have also been occasions where classified data is inappropriately extracted and placed within other documents, so working knowledge concerning this type of data is the key to recognition. Bottom line, if you think you have discovered a CMI, it is best to follow the instruction listed below until a determination is made.

What do you do if you experience a CMI? First, everyone needs to know that there is a Quick Reaction Checklist (QRC 108a) for CMIs located at: file://X:\CF\SCXS\41-Word Processing Files\QRC. That QRC contains the following instructions:

Cease all operations on affected systems

Unplug the computer from the network

Do not leave the computer unattended; you must protect it as classified.

Notify your Unit Security Manager or Commander

Notify your CSA [if unavailable notify the next in chain of command: FSA, IAO, NCC (4908), or Wing IA (4936). Notification over unsecure channels will use the acronym – CMI.

Do not discuss the contents of the email with anyone who does not have the need to know and the appropriate clearance level. All reporting must be accomplished by secure means. For more information check out the resources provided.
