Tennessee National Guard Teams with Drug Law Enforcement for Marijuana Eradication

The Tennessee National Guard recently teamed up with the U.S. Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Aviation Division's Mobile Cannabis Eradication Response Team (M-CERT) in support of an annual Cannabis (marijuana) eradication program better known as "ERAD".

The ongoing program is part of a combined effort of the Governor's Task Force on Marijuana Eradication (GTFME), which includes members of the Tennessee National Guard Counter Drug Task Force (TNCDTF), to crack down on illegal marijuana grows across the state of Tennessee. The particular partnership between the DEA and the GTFME concentrated the team's efforts specifically on the eastern regions of Tennessee. Since 2005, Tennessee has been included within the top seven states for marijuana cultivation deemed by the DEA as an "M7 State".

A mobile command post, which is deployed throughout the United States in support of eradication efforts was set up at the Army Aviation Support Facility (AASF#2) located on McGhee Tyson ANG Base for operations. "This is our office away from our office" says one Special Agent. He demonstrated how it had everything needed for the agents to get the job done while they are away from their normal work areas.

Several Army National Guard pilots from the 230th Air Cavalry Squadron located at McGhee Tyson

worked with the M-CERT providing additional aircraft and manpower to further support the combined effort. The OH-58D Kiowa Warrior helicopters flown by the soldiers are very agile single-rotor aircraft and are well-suited for the rugged mountainous terrain of East Tennessee.

"It's sometimes tricky around mountainous regions with pop-up storms and low visibility making it harder to locate the grows. Even time of day can change the visual from up there. The plants may not be as visible if there are shadows, and rain or dew on them can make them appear different too." said one DEA Special Agent/Pilot.

The pilots and spotters rely on their trained eyes to find the majority of the plants but sometimes it is just "the luck of the draw" when they find the illegal crops. "About two years ago we were turning to head back in after a long day of spotting when out of the corner of our eye we see a grow" states one Special Agent. "By pure accident we located a DTO (Drug

Trafficking Organization) grow."

"The spotter usually lets me know what altitude they would like to fly and I will keep it at that altitude... usually what is more comfortable for them to be able to spot from is where I will fly" stated one DEA Special Agent/Pilot. The spotter's job is to visually make contact with the crops and relay coordinates for law enforcement on the ground.

Getting the "all clear" to launch aircraft after a delay due to questionable weather the pilots and spotters went to work doing their routine pre-flight checks prior to take-off. Working in pairs they took to the skies to seek out the illegal plants, then radioed their locations to drug law enforcement on the ground for further search and seizure.

This was the first deployment to East Tennessee for the DEA M-CERT and was a very successful operation. 2,600 Cannabis plants were eradicated, resulting in 3 arrests and the seizure of several firearms. This success can be directly attributed to the cooperation and ceaseless efforts of the DEA M-CERT, GTFME, and the TNCDTF.

East TN bridges salute Medal of Honor recipients year-round

Many of the largest physical celebrations of our most decorated veterans can often go unnoticed despite tens of thousands of people coming across them every day in East Tennessee. These sometimes overlooked historical structures help bridge the present to a proud military past.

"Several of the bridges up and down the Tennessee River are named for Medal of Honor recipients from the Knoxville area. You're driving so fast it's hard to see and hard to read," said Joe Thompson, co-chair of the Medal of Honor Convention scheduled in Knoxville in September 2014. "There is the Buck Karnes Bridge, the Bonnyman Bridge, and the Stout Bridge. They are all tremendous stories."

Drivers on the Alcoa Highway zoom past signs that adorn the name of Knoxville-native James Earnest "Buck" Karnes. In World War I, Karnes received the Medal of Honor along with a fellow East Tennessean named Calvin John Ward. On a battlefield in France, the two men decided they "had enough" when their entire company was pinned down by a German machine gun nest. The duo stormed the German position, killed three Germans, captured seven other troops, and seized their weapons.

Karnes returned to Knoxville a hero, went on to serve 13 years as a Knoxville police officer, and in 1933 his hometown named one of its main bridges in his honor.

Drivers on the Pellissippi Parkway cross the Tennessee River on the Alexander "Sandy" Bonnyman Bridge. Bonnyman spent part of his childhood in Knoxville before moving to several locations across the country. Bonnyman eventually enlisted in

the U.S. Marine Corps and was part of the assault on the Pacific island of Tarawa during World War II.

Bonnyman and his fellow marines met brutal resistance from Japanese troops in a bombproof bunker. The Marines were trapped in a meat-grinder of gunfire and were unable to advance. Bonnyman took charge, organized a small demolition team, and stormed the bunker with explosives and flamethrowers.

Bonnyman's brave assault sent more than 100 Japanese soldiers scrambling from the bunker and helped the U.S. forces break through the Japanese defense.

The attack also cost Bonnyman his own life in the process. His remains are still somewhere on Tarawa, but the bridge and a slew of other memorials across Knox County honor his service and sacrifice.

Bravery during the Vietnam War is why drivers on Interstate 75 cross the Tennessee River on the Mitchell W. Stout Medal of Honor Memorial Bridge. When an enemy grenade landed in his squad's bunker, the young solder from Loudon County grabbed the explosive, held it against his stomach, ran outside the bunker, and absorbed the deadly blast to save his fellow soldiers.

"They are all tremendous stories. The community needs to know that Knoxville has been home to several Medal of Honor recipients and should be proud of that fact. Not just on Memorial Day, but every day," said Thompson. "This area has a proud history of honoring its veterans, which is a big part of why we were able to attract the Medal of Honor Convention to Knoxville."

So take notice of the names on the signs the next time you cross the Tennessee River on the Alcoa Highway, the Pellissippi Parkway, or Interstate 75. The names on the bridges memorialize some of our nation's most heroic military efforts.

These are only a small sampling of the many bridges,

highways, and other landmarks for Medal of Honor recipients from East Tennessee. A few others of note include the Edward R. Talley Bridge over the Clinch River on State Route 70 in Hancock County; the Milo Lemert Memorial Bridge in Savannah, TN; and the Kinser Bridge in Greene County.

The Medal of Honor is the highest award for valor in action against an enemy force which can be bestowed upon an individual serving in the Armed Services of the United States. Although it was originally created for the Civil War, Congress made the Medal of Honor a permanent decoration in 1863. The current Air Force version was approved in 1965.

CHIEFS' COUNCIL SCHOLARSHIP



The Chiefs' Council Scholarship is designed to provide financial assistance to enlisted Air National Guard members who are continuing their education after high school. The scholarship is made possible through Chiefs' Council projects. The amount of the scholarship and the number of scholarships offered is dependent on the success of our projects, and will vary from year to year.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Applicants must be an enlisted member in good standing of the 134ARW, 119CACS, or the 572 AF Band.
- 2. Applicants must be either currently enrolled or contemplating enrollment in a post-secondary educational institution (college, university, business, trade or vocational school) for the academic term for which the scholarship is awarded. Attendance may be either full or part time.
- 3. Prior recipients are eligible to apply again. However, applicants cannot be awarded a Chief's Council scholarship in consecutive years.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES:

Applicants must complete the Chiefs' Council

Scholarship Application form and attach the following documents:

- 1. A copy of the high school transcript for applicants who have never attended post-secondary education, or a copy of a college or other academic transcript.
- 2. A current CCAF progress report or degree (if applicable).
- 3. A letter from your First Sergeant stating the applicant is in good standing in the Tennessee Air National Guard.
- 4. A personal letter to the scholarship selection committee which will address the applicant's financial need, accomplishments, involvement in activities, academic or educational goals, career goals to include both civilian and military career plans for at least 1 year from the date of application, and any other pertinent information.

SELECTION CRITERIA:

The award of this scholarship will be based on:

- 1. Meeting requirements for entrance in the educational institution of the applicant's choice.
- 2. Demonstrated leadership in home, school, church, community and military activities.
- 3. Demonstrated financial need in order to begin or continue a program of study.
- 4. Educational and life goals.

The scholarship is for \$500. Applications will be accepted beginning 1 October of the award year and must be submitted by 30 November 2013. The winner will be notified during December UTA.

Application forms are available from any Chief or your unit First Sergeant. Turn in completed application packages to any Chief.

***Pre-BMT class – You will report to the FSS breakroom in the Headquarters building for roll call on **SATURDAY** of each drill at **1300**. This is a **mandatory** class **(as directed by Col. Cauthen)** until you ship out to BMT. You must report to roll call in order to get paid. Any absence must be cleared prior to roll-call through the recruiting office supervisor, Master Sgt. Curtis LaRue.

***In-processing checklist - Saturday at 1230 of your first drill weekend you are required to report to the Public Affairs/Multimedia Photo Studio (in the headquarters building) to have your portrait taken. This photo is mandatory in order to complete your in-processing checklist.

***Security Clearance Process - All new enlistees please ensure you have logged onto www.opm.gov/e-quip, to initiate your clearance. Once you have logged on, you have 60 DAYS to complete this. This is a mandatory item. Failure to complete on time will result in a counseling session with the Force Support Squadron Commander, Lt. Col. Dean Thiele. Note: answer 'unknown' the first time and only the first time you answer the question 'place of birth.'

Making Every Dollar Count through State Lodging Tax Exemptions

The Air Force encourages you to stop paying taxes! Well, not your personal taxes, but it turns out that several states exempt uniformed service members and Federal Government employees from paying state lodging taxes when on official travel orders. Unfortunately, travelers have to know to ask for these exemptions, and as a result Air Force members pay about \$4.5 million in lodging taxes needlessly in these locations each year. If you are travelling to Florida, Texas, New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Missouri, or one of seven other states and territories that offer these exemptions, a few simple steps can save your unit and the Air Force real money.

Considering today's fiscal challenges coupled with tomorrow's uncertainties, the Air Force is continuously searching for cost-saving initiatives. In a memo to comptrollers across the Air Force, Assistant Secretary for Financial Management Jamie Morin said, "The Vice Chief of Staff has taken a key step forward with the "Every Dollar Counts" campaign and we have received a huge response from Airmen around the world. One idea that caught my attention pertains to state lodging tax exemptions, which could save millions for reinvestment in mission needs."

Eleven states plus Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands exempt U.S. military members and employees of the United States government from paying state taxes on hotel lodging charges which are directly

reimbursable by the U.S. government. This lodging sales tax exemption applies to both TDY and PCS travel paid using the Government Travel Card. (All government travelers are already exempt from lodging tax if their lodging bill is paid directly by the government using a Centrally Billed Account.)

GSA maintains a website and map with state tax information at this URL: https://smartpay.gsa.gov/about-gsa-smartpay/tax-information/state-response-letter. Some states require a form and some do not. Puerto Rico and six states (FL, MA, NY, PA, TX, and WI) do require a form, and it is downloadable from this GSA website. The U.S. Virgin Islands and the other five states (AK, DE, KS, MO, OR) do not require any special forms.

All travelers should take advantage of this tax savings and be aware of these state laws. If you are about to go on official travel to one of these locations, you should visit the GSA website before traveling and obtain the tax exemption form if applicable. Also, all travelers should check with their hotel to verify state tax law compliance. If the hotel does not comply, the traveler should consider another hotel. Approving Officials should review travel authorizations and vouchers for strict compliance with this requirement. By everyone doing their part, the Air Force can save millions of dollars!

POSSIBLE INSIDER THREAT 10 INDICATORS OF TERRORIST ASSOCIATED THREATS

- 1. Advocating violence or the threat of violence to political or ideological goals
- 2. Advocating support for international terrorist organizations / objectives
- 3. Providing financial or material support to terrorist / terrorist organization
- 4. Association with or connections to known or suspected terrorist
- 5. Repeated expressions of hatred or intolerance of society or Constitution
- 6. Repeated browsing of terrorist websites outside of official duties
- 7. Expressing an obligation to engage in violence in support of terrorist acts.
- 8. Purchasing bomb making materials or obtaining bomb construction information
- 9. Activate attempts to encourage others to violate laws, disobev lawful orders, or disrupt military activities
- **10**. Familiar ties to known or suspected International Terrorist or Terrorist Supporters



Information Assurance Awareness: A Risk to One is a Risk to All!



Classified Message Incidents & You

What do you do if you are sent an email that you suspect contains classified information?

Refer to: 134ARW/VA 33-200c; *Green-Red-Yellow card posted near your computers/phones

A CMI is a classified message that has been sent and/or received over an unclassified network. It can be in the body of an email or in an attachment.

Step 1 – Stop! If the system has wireless capability (laptop) turn off the wireless.

Step 2 – Disconnect the LAN cable unless otherwise instructed by communications personnel.

Step 3 – Secure the affected system(s) and or printers in a GSA approved container or vault, OR post someone with appropriate clearance.

Step 4 – Report Immediately! Use a secure phone or convey in person to your unit security manager or commander. Notify your CSA; if unavailable contact the NCC at ext. 4908 or the Wing IA at ext. 4936.

** Over unsecure channels use the acronym "CMI" do not discuss details via this method.

"MYPAY" OR NO PAY APPS

OVERVIEW:

The purpose of this Cyber Crime Alert Notice is to inform Department of Defense personnel of third party mobile applications that reference the Department Finance and Accounting Services (DFAS) myPay system for federal employees and members of the uniformed services, but are not sponsored by the Department of Defense or U.S. Government. DFAS processes pay for all DoD military and civilian personnel, retirees and annuitants, and also supports other government agencies. Using non-sanctioned applications to access your myPay account can potentially lead to the compromise of your myPay account information and theft of funds. CID elements are encouraged to brief supported installations and units on the contents of this 2CAN.

BACKGROUND:

An application called "MyPay DFAS LES" was initially released on 13 Jul 13, as a free application on Google Play Android App Store. The App provides the user with the ability to control their military pay after the user enters their myPay login information to access their individual account. Additionally, it provides the ability for the user to update their security questions to reset their password. Google Play estimates that between 10,000-50,000 members have already installed this App. A broader review of mobile App sites disclosed several other myPay related Apps for Android and iPhone devices.

This App is not sponsored or endorsed by the Department of Defense or DFAS.


