McGhee Tyson Airmen Support 58th Presidential Inauguration

Washington, D.C. (Feb. 2, 2017) – The 134th Air Refueling Wing and 119th Command and Control Squadron assisted Joint Task Force-District of Columbia (JTF-DC) National Guard to supplement security, communications, logistical support, public affairs, medical assistance, emergency management and other duties to support civilian authorities during the 58th Presidential Inauguration in Washington, D.C. Jan. 16-21, 2017.

The Joint Task Force-District of Columbia lead a force of roughly 7,500 National Guard Soldiers and Airmen from about 40 states, territories and the District of Columbia. The support was at the request of local civilian authorities as well as federal government agency partners.

More than 40 McGhee Tyson guardsmen were elected to provide support for the inauguration.

Tech. Sgts. Daniel Gagnon and Jonathan Young, photojournalists from the 134th Public Affairs office were selected to assist JTF-DC with media operations.

Several members of the 119th Joint Incident Site Communications Capability system team (JISCC) provided backup communications capabilities.

Nine members of the 134th Force Support Squadron were on hand to assist with planning, coordinating, and distributing meals at six different locations. The FSS Airmen helped provide Unit Grade Rations (UGRs) and Meals Ready to Eat (MREs) for approx. 2,600 Airmen and Soldiers.

Several hundred National Guard members provided ceremonial support; including marching in the Inaugural parade and rendering the first National Guard salute to the President.

Military support by Guardsmen dates back to 1798 when Gen. George Washington began his inaugural journey from Mount Vernon, Va. to New York City. The National Guard has continued with this tradition of inaugural support.

The National Guard remained ready, reliable, essential and accessible throughout the inaugural event to be called upon by civilian authorities to provide assistance as requested.





TENNESSEE STRONG ACT

Support, Training and Renewing Opportunity for National Guardsmen

The Tennessee STRONG (Support, Training, and Renewing Opportunity for National Guardsmen) Act establishes a pilot program to provide eligible members of the Tennessee National Guard tuition funding toward a first time bachelor degree for the next four years through a tuition reimbursement program. The STRONG Act provides educational opportunities for those who protect and serve our state and country and supports the Drive to 55 goal of equipping 55 percent of Tennesseans with a degree or certificate by 2025.

Why Tennessee STRONG?

The STRONG Act provides consistency for recruiting, increases competitiveness with surrounding states and expands opportunities for those who protect and serve our state and country.

- Recruitment: Enables recruiters to relay consistent information to new recruits regarding guaranteed tuition reimbursement in specific amounts for eligible members. In past years, under the existing Tennessee National Guard Tuition Assistance Act of 2004, the amount of funding for tuition has fluctuated with whatever amount has been appropriated.
- Competitiveness: Makes the Tennessee National Guard more competitive with surrounding states. All but four states nationwide, and all states adjacent to Tennessee, already offer 100 percent state tuition assistance.
- Opportunity: Offers a funding mechanism to increase the educated population in Tennessee for those who currently serve in the Tennessee National Guard by filling the gap between the availability of federal tuition assistance and the amount needed to pay for tuition.

What are the eligibility requirements for the tuition reimbursement program?


To be eligible, the individual must:

- Be admitted to and enroll in an eligible institution (any Tennessee public community college, public university, or private college or university, all of which must be regionally accredited) •Individuals attending private institutions will be reimbursed for the average cost at a public institution.
- Maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 •An individual who loses eligibility for failing to maintain a 2.0 grade point average may regain eligibility upon maintaining a 2.0 grade point average in a subsequent semester.
- Apply for and use federal tuition assistance
- Be in good standing with the Tennessee National Guard and currently serving
- Apply for the reimbursement within 90 days of course completion

As a last-dollar reimbursement, the amount of state tuition reimbursement is offset by any other funds received. The tuition reimbursement will be made to the educational institution on behalf of an eligible member for no more than 120 credit hours or eight semesters toward a first time bachelor's degree.

Drive to 55

In 2013, Governor Haslam launched the Drive to 55 to increase the number of Tennesseans with a postsecondary degree or certificate to 55 percent by 2025. With the support of the General Assembly, the Drive to 55 is changing the landscape of what is possible in Tennessee public higher education, its workforce and economy. In addition to strengthening the Tennessee National Guard, the STRONG Act will strengthen our workforce and economy and contribute to the Drive to 55.



MODERN SLAVERY WORLDWIDE

On January 4, 2017, President Barack Obama published the annual proclamation of January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month. The DoD, Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) is currently developing technologies to assist law enforcement in the investigation of human trafficking.

One current program under development is called Memex. Memex is focused on developing software that will far exceed the capabilities of current online search engines, within the open web and dark web, which will further aid in detection of criminal activity, such as human trafficking,. Characteristics of this software will allow it to collect online behavioral signals such as key words, phrases, and reoccurring telephone numbers that occur in web based forums, chats, advertisements, job postings, hidden services, etc.or ads where people may be trafficked. For example, part of the Memex suite of tools, Tellfinder captures telephone numbers and other data to reveal trafficking activity and summarizes the behavior of and relationships between the entities that post them. Additionally not only will this software will be able to reveal trends and patterns relating to human behavior it will also be used for analysis of images and networks of people to generate leads for criminal investigators.

Today, more than 33 law enforcement agencies from the U.S. and U.K. are using the web based tools created by Memex to locate and prosecute human traffickers. The Memex project continues to recruit experts in image analysis, text analysis or web crawling from commercial sources and universities to continue evolving this technology to fight this heinous crime. 1. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND PROCEDURES:

Prior Enlisted personnel, Commissioned Officer in the grade of Major or below (Active or Reserve) or non-prior service civilian may apply if qualified for commission as follows:

- **NON-COMMISSIONED APPLICANT AGE:** Due to the length of administrative processing involved in the commissioning process, applicants **must** be selected by age **28** and be no more than age **30** by the start date of the board's first available **Undergraduate Pilot Training Class (UPT)**. This will allow time for **non-prior commissioned** applicants to graduate from the Academy of Military Science as an ANG officer prior to attending UPT. **Prior-Commissioned Applicant** must have not exceeded rank-age ceiling. Call MSgt LaRue at 865-336-3242/DSN266-3242 for eligibility clarification.
- **MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS:** Applicants **must** pass a Flying Class 1 physical (Appointment ANG/AF Commissioning physical).
- **AIR FORCE OFFICER QUALIFYING TEST (AFOQT):** Applicants **must** have taken the AFOQT and qualify with a minimum score of **Verbal-15; Quantitative-10; Pilot 25; Navigator 10; Sum-50 (Sum is the minimum composite score required by adding both the scores of Pilot and Navigator.) Applicants must meet or exceed the minimum Pilot and/or Navigator scores to qualify for appointment and attendance of Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT).**
- **EDUCATION:** Applicants **require** as a minimum a Bachelor's Degree from an educational institute listed in the current Accredited Institutions of Post Secondary Education. For entry into this specialty, undergraduate degree specializing in physical sciences, mathematics, administration, or management is desired. **Applicant must have attained the degree prior to attendance of Officer Training School.**
- **SPECIALTY QUALIFICATIONS:** Knowledge is mandatory of theory of flight, air navigation, meteorology, flying directives, aircraft operating procedures, and mission tactics. For entry into this specialty, completion of Air Force Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT).
- **PILOT CANDIDATE SELECTION METHOD (PCSM):** Must complete Test of Basic Aviation Skills (TBAS) to obtain score. **PCSM Score of 10 or higher is required.** PCSM information website: <https://pcsm.aetc.af.mil/>.
- **LETTER OF AGREEMENT:** Applicants **must** submit a letter of agreement to attend within one year (pending availability of school quotas) of commissioning (or assignment if prior commissioned officer) any initial formal training as listed in the Training Requirements section.
- **COMMISSION REINSTATEMENT:** Prior commissioned officers must be eligible to reinstate commission and retrain. Cross-component service officers will not be required to attend the Academy of Military Science.

134th Civil Engineer Squadron Debris Clearance Team Respond to Gatlinburg Wildfires & Polk County Tornado

On 30 November 2016, members of the 134th Civil Engineer Squadron were called to State Active Duty to support recovery efforts associated with the Gatlinburg Wildfires. Twenty personnel were selected to serve as members of the Debris Clearance Team, which consisted of an Emergency Manager, Command Post Controller, Comm Technician, Heavy Equipment Operators, Electricians, Firefighters, and Operations/Maintenance personnel. Upon reporting to the Incident Command Center in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, the team was assigned to locate and clear debris on various roadways within the Downtown Gatlinburg area.



Following minor clearing activities, the team was re-tasked to support broader Sevier County operations which encompassed roadway and right of way clearance to ensure safety for pedestrians and emergency responders. On 1 December, the team reported to the Sevier County Emergency Operations Center and was assigned to clear Shields Mountain. While there the team performed clearing operations on four roadways, where they identified and cleared 7 large trees and 5 downed utility poles, providing access for emergency responders.

Upon completion of all clearing activities, the team was re-tasked to Polk County, TN on 2 December 2016, to support the local Highway Department in tornado relief efforts. While there the team was assigned to clear and remove all debris from Reynolds Bridge Road within 10 feet of the Right of Way. During operations the team received a visit from TN Governor Bill Haslam, U.S. Senator Bob Corker, U.S. Senator Lamar Alexander, TEMA Director Patrick Sheehan, and The Adjutant General of TN Major General Max Haston. All parties voiced their appreciation for the TN ANG's cleanup efforts and MG Haston requested to learn more about the ANG's debris clearance and search & rescue capabilities. Over the two day period, the team cleared and removed over 39 dump truck loads of debris from Reynolds Bridge Road and successfully reopened the roadway for full operation.



The first deployment of the Debris Clearance Package was an overwhelming success. This tasking provided an excellent opportunity for the 134 CES to fully comprehend the capability of the package. As a result it was determined

that the kit was very effective and capable of performing extensive and expeditious debris clearance operations. The kit's overall capability far exceeded the tasking provided, validating its usefulness during domestic operations. Initial road clearing following disasters are easily accomplished with this package in a short amount of time. Having fully tested the capability of the Debris Clearance Kit we are now optimistic and fully committed to the continued use of this valuable asset during future domestic operations.

*****Security Clearance Process** - All new enlistees please ensure you have logged onto www.opm.gov/e-quip, to initiate your clearance. Once you have logged on, you have **60 DAYS** to complete this. This is a **mandatory** item. **Failure to complete on time will result in a counseling session with the Force Support Squadron Commander, Lt. Col. Dean Thiele.** Note: answer 'unknown' the first time and only the first time you answer the question 'place of birth.'


